



The Western Australian Birds of Prey Centre, established in 2004, aims to rehabilitate Birds of Prey, and uses educational displays to help vocalise the need for protecting this special group of birds. Some birds are unable to be released back into the wild, so the WA Birds of Prey Centre looks after them, and those who are able, get to join the educational displays. These displays show people how important conservation of the bird's natural habitat is to the survival of these species, doing so by showing flight and feeding behaviours.

On Thursday 5th October, fourteen volunteers from BHP spent their day at the Western Australian Birds of Prey Centre. As the day began, the team broke into groups. One group smashed through trimming branches around the chicken coop and reattaching a gate, they then moved on to cleaning the enclosures. Group two were the gardening gurus, raking leaves, mowing and general gardening which was a big task. Group through worked to build an aviary which required a lot of problem solving. At the end of the day the team got to hold and interact with the resident snake, blue tongue and Waalitj the Eagle.
